Today is Rogation Sunday! What does that mean?

Rogation comes from the Latin word "rogatio," meaning "asking" or "beseeching". Rogation Sunday and the following Rogation Days are a time to ask God for blessings and guidance.

Purpose:

Rogation Days traditionally involve praying for the blessing of the land, its resources, and the well-being of all its inhabitants. We gather to acknowledge our interconnectedness to one another and the land. Rogation is not just about celebrating our cooperation in the fields or sharing the workload but it is about experiencing and sharing God's love as the Creator of heaven and earth.

Practice:

There is a tradition of "beating the bounds" whereby processions stopped at boundary marks and other significant parish landmarks with special prayers, processions, and sometimes fasting.


Stewardship:

Rogation observances can also be an opportunity to reflect on our responsibility as stewards of God's creation and the importance of caring for the environment.

Historical Roots:

The practice of Rogation Days has roots in the 5th century in France, where they were observed after a series of natural disasters. They were originally days of fasting and prayer known as "Grass Days." Rogare' is Latin for 'to ask.' Rogationtide is a festival primarily focused on the planting season to ask for an abundant harvest in light of calamities such as war, disease, bad weather and natural disasters.

FIRST LESSON

Sirach (Ecclesiasticus) 38:27-32

A reading from the book of Sirach, the thirty-eighth chapter...

So it is with every artisan and master artisan who labours by night as well as by day;

those who cut the signets of seals, each is diligent in making a great variety;

they set their heart on painting a lifelike image, and they are careful to finish their work.

So it is with the smith, sitting by the anvil, intent on his ironwork;

the breath of the fire melts his flesh, and he struggles with the heat of the furnace;

the sound of the hammer deafens his ears, and his eyes are on the pattern of the object.

He sets his heart on finishing his handiwork, and he is careful to complete its decoration.

So it is with is the potter sitting at his work and turning the wheel with his feet;

he is always deeply concerned over his products, and he produces them in quantity.

He moulds the clay with his arm and makes it pliable with his feet; he sets his heart on finishing the glazing, and he takes care in firing the kiln.

All these rely on their hands, and all are skilful in their own work.

Without them no city can be inhabited, and wherever they live, they will not go hungry.

Yet they are not sought out for the council of the people,

Romans 8:19-22


A reading from Paul's first letter to the Corinthians, the third chapter

As our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to pray,


